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### Virtual dialogue between Chinese, American Gen Zers

On Monday, Oct. 18, I sat on the dais of the Roanoke City Council Chamber and logged into my laptop for an extraordinary event – a virtual dialogue between Chinese and American Gen Zer students celebrating educational growth and talent. (Gen Z, or zoomers, describes people who were born 1997-2012.) Seeing students from different time zones and different lived experiences connect virtually to share their ideas, questions and talents was a truly inspiring moment.

The event was organized by the China Public Diplomacy Association (CPDA) and Global Times Online and hosted in connection with the Association for Friendship with Foreign Countries of Yunnan Province, the People's Government of Malipo County.

Students from William Byrd High School, led by their teacher, Chris Carr, and the Malipo National Middle School participated in the dialogue and exchange of ideas. Participating Byrd students were Wyatt Bowles, Kaitlyn Ferguson, TJ Bunn, Noah Franks, John Kiker, Lexi Aguino, Sela Beatty, Devin Liu, Kassidy Wrye, Corinae Turner, Daniel Letz, Jake Hilliard, Timber Raines and Milla Farrington.

The dialogue included a section of icebreakers exploring different aspects of American and Chinese cultures, then a talent show featuring the playing of musical instruments, singing and poetry, and dialogue topics on emerging ideas in language, sports, industry, entertainment, science and technology and social development. Chris Carr



gave an overview of Roanoke Valley and WBHS history. Special thanks go to Wei-Li from Lijiang and Mei-Li Foy and Mary Jo Fassié in Roanoke for coordinating our student

team from William Byrd High School.

The moderator, Su Yuting, convened the dialogue with opening speeches by Chinese diplomats, including the Chinese Ambassador to the U.S., Qin Gang. I was honored to offer words of welcome on behalf of the City of Roanoke, and highlighted the relationship we share with the people of Lijiang, one of our seven sister cities.

Roanoke has a long connection with Yunnan Province beginning with one

of our beloved citizens, Pearl Fu, who grew up in Yunnan and helped establish our relationship with Lijiang in 1996. Pearl's family was a member of the black Yi tribe; her grandfather was Lung

Dr. and Mrs. Roth created and administered a retreat center at their



In 2008, one of Pearl's daughters, Colette, began a photography project, "We are Tiger Dragon People," as she learned about her Yi ancestry and explored her family's heritage. In 2019, the Taubman Museum of Art in downtown Roanoke featured a large exhibit of the pop-up books by Colette Fu and introduced the people of the Yunnan province to Roanoke residents.

extremely challenging for the health and well-being of the people of the United States and China, our students reminded us of how essential ours are, and how, through exchange programs like this, we can grow our mutual support for one another. Even in difficult times globally and politically, our people – with our students leading the way -- can overcome any obstacle by growing our relationships with one another.

# Lijiang, China A launch point for adventure

With its ancient cobbled lanes and overlapping waterways, the Lijiang Old Town in Yunnan province, named a UNESCO World Heritage Site in 1997, has long been a popular escape destination for China's city dwellers. The smoky flavors of dishes from the country's Naxi minority are popular with visitors, as is the selection of craft beers and cocktails in the charming pub Stone the Crows. And several new luxury hotels work to highlight the region's natural beauty. Among them: Hylla Vintage Hotel and Cloud Nature Experience Center, whose undulating, walkable roof mimics the rolling hills behind it; and Hilton Lijiang, which has its own hanging garden. Lijiang is also the main access point for Tiger Leaping Gorge—a spectacular hiking trail tracing the Jinsha River—which just reopened after a halfyear closure for renovations.

### **RVSC's intern report**

### College senior's internship has a French accent

This academic year (Sept. 2021-May 2022), I am interning with RVSCI as part of my studies at Roanoke College (RC). Because I am majoring

Charissa Roberson in French, my internship has been focused primarily on the sister city of Saint-Lô, France, and our connections there. I would like to share about my experiences so far and the various exciting projects I have had the privilege of working on during my internship!

A major project that I have undertaken is the creation of an Instagram account to promote the relationship between Roanoke and Saint-Lô. The goal of the account is to share interesting information about both cities, in French and English, so that residents of Roanoke and Saint-Lô can follow the account and learn about their sister city across the ocean. To acquire this information, I created a questionnaire to poll residents about things such as their favorite cafés or parks, the best things to do and see in their city, or what the topography and flora/fauna are like. Mme. Mary Jo Fassié and Mme. Jeanine Vérove were instrumental in delivering the French questionnaire to residents of Saint-Lô. Through their help, I received a number of responses from Saint-Lô, including responses from a school. I have also received responses from Roanoke residents by posting the questions on my personal Instagram account.

The account, @roanoke\_saintlo, currently has nine posts and 65 followers. I have posted historical information, such as how the cities were twinned, as well as more light-hearted information, such as the best cafés and parks in each city. I hope to continue adding to this account in the upcoming months, and I hope that it will be a fun and informative resource for people looking to learn more about RVSCI and the connection between Roanoke and Saint-Lô.

In addition to working on the Instagram project, last semester I conducted an interview with former

RVSCI intern Liesl Greider. She completed two internships, one in Saint-Lô and one based in Roanoke. Over Zoom, we talked at length about her experiences and what she learned while working with RVSCI. Afterward, I transcribed, edited, and formatted our conversation into an article; Liesl also sent me pictures that I was able to incorporate. The article was sent to RVSCI, and a copy is posted in Lucas Hall, the Department of Modern Languages at RC. I hope to post the article on RC's website as well. Liesl graciously and eloquently shared a wealth of information about her experiences, and I thoroughly enjoyed hearing from her. I hope that our conversation will be informative and inspiring to anyone seeking to intern with RVSCI!

As part of my internship, I have also assisted at RVSCI events. In September, I attended a salsa night for Roanoke City's Welcome Week. We danced and enjoyed international foods, and we also got to talk to people about RVSCI. Later, at RC's internship fair, I represented RVSCI and spoke with many of my fellow students about the opportunities available. We had a sign-up sheet for people to write down their contact details if they wished to receive more information. At the end of the night, we had two pages of sign-ups! The internship fair was an excellent opportunity to raise awareness about the organization on RC's campus. In upcoming months, I plan to host an

information session on campus to inform even more students about the local and global opportunities RVSCI offers.

I have greatly enjoyed learning more about Saint-Lô through my work with RVSCI. However, my interest in Saint-Lô extends beyond my internship. As part of my senior year at RC, I am working on a multimedia, bilingual (French/ English) production that will tell two stories from WWII-era Saint-Lô. The production, "Le Carrefour de Saint-Lô/ The Crossroads of Saint-Lô," follows the parallel lives of Thomas Howie, a major from Virginia, and Raymond Robin, a member of the French Resistance in Saint-Lô. With the invaluable help of RVSCI and other connections in France, I have been able to conduct extensive research into the French side of the story, through newspapers, books, and personal accounts. I have also received tremendous help from the Howie family as I researched their family's story. The production is set to take place on April 2, at 7 p.m., in the Wortmann Ballroom at RC. I hope that anyone interested in RVSCI, Saint-Lô, and/or WWII will consider joining us for this immersive evening, as we explore these incredible stories together!

Charissa Roberson is also managing coeditor for the literary magazine Roanoke Review, and she edits the Entertainment page for the student newspaper, The Brackety-Ack.



### Magazine spotlights Fassié family holiday traditions

It would be hard to talk about Dr. Pierre and Mary Jo Fassié's love of French culture without first talking about another love story – their own.

Pierre Fassié grew up in southern France, and the couple met when Mary Jo came to Avignon to study French language and literature in her junior year of college.

"He was my conversation monitor," Mary Jo remembers with a laugh. "We would eat lunch together and speak in French, and our conversations kind of continued on for the rest of the afternoon."

The rest was history, as they say. The pair married and moved to Roanoke, where they dedicated their lives to sharing the language and culture they loved. Pierre served more than 30 years teaching French and Spanish at William Fleming High School; Mary Jo taught French for 40. Both led pen pal programs and student exchange programs, and now, post-retirement, they continue to promote cultural exchange through the Roanoke Valley Sister Cities organization, where Mary Jo serves as president.

"I think that most people will agree that a cultural exchange is a lifechanging experience," says Mary Jo. "One learns to look at life from another person's or country's point of view."

So it should come as no surprise that, during the holiday season, the Fassiés' home is alive with the French point of view – the sights, sounds and flavors of a region that means so much to them.

"Christmas is our major family celebration," Pierre says. That's why, on any given day in December, you might hear traditional French Christmas carols or modern French holiday music in the background in their home. You might also spot an assortment of their favorite friandises – small French holiday candies

and candied fruits – mailed specially by Pierre's brother, just in time for the season.

"It's hard to get that here," Mary Jo says, "so he sends us a big box that will last us several months."

But perhaps most special of all is the Fassiés' elaborate crèche *Provençale*, which the family sets up about three weeks before Christmas. "It is a Nativity scene animated with over 60 colorful figurines from southern France," explains Pierre. The santons or "little saints" that populate the scene – each about two to three inches tall and hand-carved by a *santonnier* from baked clay – represent "nineteenth-century rural characters in traditional garments, each bringing an offering emblematic of their profession to Jesus and his family," Pierre says.

The Fassiés have collected these slowly, adding to them from their travels throughout France, and they include "the mayor, the village *curé*, who is the priest, a miller, a painter – just all kinds

of different occupations," Mary Jo says.
"And they might be bringing their local
garden vegetables or produce or animals
or flowers as offerings to the crèche."

Each acquisition represents a special place or memory from their travels, Mary Jo says.

### Ensuring clean water for 2 schools, nearby villages

Following a November 2021 conference call with the African Committee of Sister City International, we took on a project to improve drinking water supplies in two villages near Kisumu. Phyliss Venable provided information about CampWater Industries, which had done a water treatment project in Mombasa, Kenya, and arranged for her contacts there to work with us. I asked Joseph Akeyo of Support Aid Ministry in Richmond to set us up with a site at the God's Little Angel private school in Kisumu to serve as a demonstration project. Our Sister City committee provided support for the school in 2021.

By the end of November we had a contract to provide the water tests and had engaged Simon Okoth, a Virginia Commonwealth University professor who has experience with water projects in Kenya and elsewhere, to assist. He has helped with Magunga Primary School in Katito Township near Kisumu and offered to have that school be a part of

the project as well. I hope that once the water supplies are validated we can set up a distribution network that will not only provide clean water for the two schools but also for nearby villages.

In December, I formally agreed to provide the funds to pay for the water tests and arranged to hire CampWater Industries to do the contract work. Our Sister City board approved the expenditure and transferred the funds

to Joseph who visited Kisumu and met with Joshua Sila and CampWater. Once the two water sources are tested, we will ensure that they meet water quality standards. Then we will determine what it will cost to install the purification equipment. Simon and Joseph were to have done the final site visits in January.

To raise the funds to install the systems, we will seek donations, grants and in-kind support. Our goal is to engage the County of Kisumu government and the United Nations Africa Support team. If we are successful, we can consider expanding to other communities in Kenya and in East Africa. The communities can then take on the maintenance and distribution challenges and may even sell bottled water to pay expenses.

I followed up with John Wiercioch, a Roanoke Valley artist who has friends in Kenya and who plans to visit there this month. He agreed to photograph the project sites and meet with local representatives at each place. I put John in touch with Samba Nixon of the City of Kisumu Urban Area Association, another group we have supported, to document the installations and engage local government officials. In the meantime, we received an offer of financial support from the Rev. Paul Fritts of Macedonia Christian Church in Orange, Va.

### Roanoke-Pskov

### Pskov officials dedicated to making a greener city

Roanoke made a name for itself within the biking community with its interconnected greenways, bicycle lanes, and dedication to alternative forms of urban transportation. Similarly, Pskov will become the first Russian city to develop a Sustainable Urban Mobility Plan (the "SUMP"). As in Roanoke, Pskov's officials realized that making their city greener would also make it healthier and more sustainable for its citizens.

Reliable, affordable public transportation is a global issue. Public transportation isn't widely used in Russia because of its systemic limitations. For many citizens, it simply isn't available as a travel option. In April 2014, Russia adopted the World

**Health Organization and United Nations** Economic Commission for Europe's Paris Declaration, dubbed THE PEP. This acronym stands for "Transport, Health, and Environment: Pan-European Programme" and uses the slogan "Cities in Motion: People First!"The 2014 Paris meeting amended the 2009 Amsterdam Declaration's original four goals by adding a fifth, "[t]o integrate transport, health and environmental objectives into urban and spatial planning policies." (unece.org/DAM/thepep/ Publications/2015\_and\_pdf\_Signs\_and\_ signals/Paris\_Declaration\_in\_English\_ Final.pdf).

Pskov City planners face similar challenges as those in Roanoke: capacity, zoning, and implementation. To implement the best and most successful policies, Russian cities have been studying what works in other nations,

particularly those within the Nordic region. With a goal of reducing the number of personal vehicles on its roads, Pskov City Administration is conducting a traffic study to estimate demand. In 2017, Pskov was awarded the Green Mobility Award, and it continues to take great strides forward.

"The SUMP will help to develop solutions for better use of urban space, to reduce the number of personal vehicles and plan a compact transport infrastructure, allocating as much space as possible to the historical center of Pskov for citizens and city guests." (www. cities-multimodal.eu/news/city-pskov-develops-russias-first-sump). Pskov's laudable efforts should be of interest to Roanoke as it undertakes the work we also value -- making our city greener and our citizens healthier.
